LETTER FROM OUR RECTOR, REVD DR STEVE STEWART

As a child of the 1960s, it comes very naturally to me that things change. The very anthem of my childhood era was Bob Dylan's "The Times they are a-Changing". The 1960s may have been a particular era of radical change, but I wonder if the 2020s will be looked back on as a time of equally seismic cultural shifts.

However, the way in which most of us experience change is simply that which occurs in the very nature of life itself: birth, death, marriage, changing jobs, moving houses, divorce, illness, accumulation of wealth, or sudden loss of earnings. Just as we watch the seasons of nature change through our lives, so come days when we realise that nothing will be the same ever again.

How then is it part of the hardwiring of the human mind that we long for stability, things which are concrete, values which are sacred and unchanging? One thing we might note is that all human beings in all ages across the world have sought God. Not just a creator God, but a God who is active and the author of righteousness and stability.

Nonetheless, when we human beings invent our own gods, we tend to make them in our own image – and that very god becomes unstable and unpredictable.

But as Christians we worship a God not of our own invention, a product of our own brain, but a God who in Jesus Christ has revealed himself to us! And the wonderful news is that all of that longed-for hope, stability, certainty, love, goodness, eternity and truth can be found in Him.

Though blessed with great parents and a happy childhood, a stable home and a loving family, my own testimony is that I have never found anyone who offers what Jesus offers. And He doesn't just offer it to me: for all of us who go through the ups and downs of this sometimes very difficult life, He offers all those good things to you as well.

So, as we look out of the window and see the seasons changing, know that, as the Bible tells us, "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and for ever" (Hebrews 13:8).

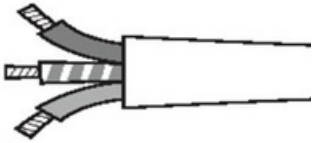

News from Oxfordshire County Council

Potholes are still an overriding issue, particularly the fact that repairs are poorly carried out and soon need redoing. Liam Walker, our County Councillor, is continuing to put pressure on the Highways Department to improve delivery and ensure contractor compliance with guarantees. Remember to use Fix my Street App to report potholes.

News from West Oxfordshire District Council

Savings made over the last year have enabled the cost of garden waste bins to be frozen this year. Additionally, units to house the homeless have been procured to save on hotel bills. Salt Cross Area Action Plan has been formally approved with a Net Zero requirement. Campaign on food waste - 25% of contents of grey bins is still food waste (some still edible). Mobile phone reception now working alongside OCC to get better analysis of problem areas. Fly tipping - please notify WODC as soon as you see any, to prevent further build up.

FREELAND ENERGY GROUP (FEG)

The weather at this end of winter was not great, but wet days have meant that the group wasn't able to respond to neighbours' requests for thermal imaging. A thermal image for many can be the proof of cold leaking in. Not that FEG wants to enter into any domestic arguments, but a picture might be the proof needed to convince the household that yes there is a draught around the window. Get in touch with FEG to be added to the waiting list for thermal imaging. And about that draught - for under the door why not try your hand at making a sausage draught excluder? Old clothes stuffed into a tube of fabric can be surprisingly efficient. Or you can see sample draft excluders next time we have the energy saving stall out. (And you only have to ask, for us to come along to one of your community group meetings with that table.)



We don't expect you'll be surprised to know that transport comes within the CAPZero action plan, and with that in mind look out for an addition to the First and Last Mile's service. From May we expect to see a Saturday journey linking North Leigh, Hanborough and Freeland to Eynsham. More details to come.

Also for the village, the Freeland Community Hub (FCH) has appointed an architect for the renovation of the Methodist Chapel, which will start when the sale is completed. FCH are hoping that the Chapel will be an exemplar for sustainability and conservation, contributing to the CAPZero targets, with improved insulation and under floor heating by an air-source heat pump. Looking wider for events in the area to add to your calendar include Eynsham's Great Big Green Weekend - **Friday 12th to Sunday 14th June**, and in the autumn, their Open Homes event is **12th & 13th September**. This will showcase changes people have made to their homes to increase energy efficiency and or generation.

DEVELOPER FUNDING MUST BE USED TO SUPPORT OUR COMMUNITIES

You may have seen recent reports that Oxfordshire County Council is holding **£269** million in unspent developer contributions. This money is collected from developers through planning agreements and is intended to help fund vital infrastructure such as roads, school places, transport improvements, and community facilities needed when new housing is built.

Of that total, **£154.5** million has been allocated specifically for schools and education, highlighting the scale of the funding available and the importance of ensuring it is used to support our growing communities.

These contributions are meant to ensure that when new homes are built, the infrastructure needed to support those homes is delivered alongside them. However, far too much of this funding is currently sitting unspent in council accounts, rather than being invested in improvements that residents can see and benefit from.

Across our area, many residents are already feeling the pressure that comes with development. Increased traffic, pressure on school places and stretched local services, overloaded sewage systems, are all concerns I regularly hear about when speaking with residents.

At the same time, proposals in the new District Council Local Plan could see around 18,000 additional homes built across West Oxfordshire in the coming years. With this level of growth being proposed, it is absolutely vital that infrastructure keeps pace with development.

Developer contributions should help deliver improvements such as safer roads, additional school capacity, better transport links, and investment in local facilities so that communities can continue to thrive as they grow.

As your County Councillor, I am continuing to press the County Council to ensure this money is actually spent where it is needed.

It is no good for hundreds of millions of pounds to sit in a council bank account while communities are dealing with the pressures created by new development. This funding was collected for a purpose, and it should be used to deliver the infrastructure that residents were promised. Residents quite rightly expect that when development takes place, the infrastructure should come with it not years later.

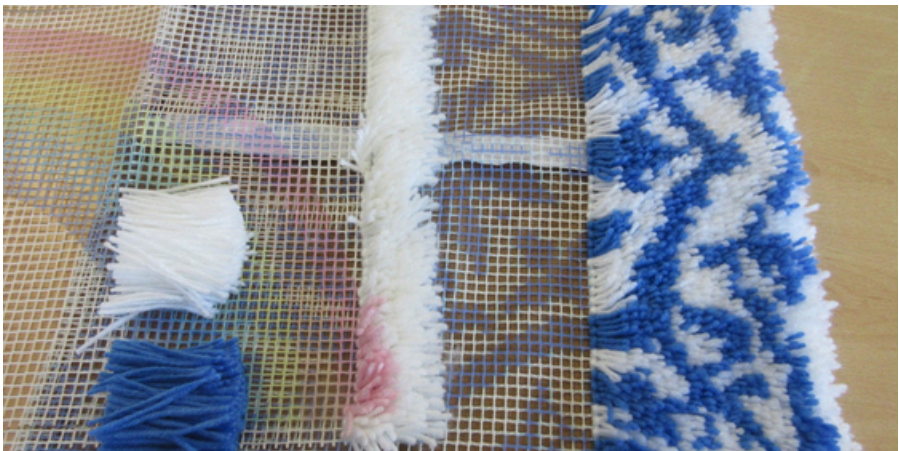

UPDATES FROM WODC

The Council approved the Area Action Plan (AAP) to the development of Salt Cross Garden Village. The Inspector's report, published after a rigorous and extended examination process, fully supported the Council's strategy for delivering a climate-conscious, well-designed and future-ready community. Crucially, it confirmed that the Council's flagship Net Zero Carbon Development policy - which sets ambitious energy efficiency requirements for new buildings - is justified, effective and fit for purpose. This is a great achievement that puts the council ahead of other local authorities. It would not have happened without the support of our communities.



An outline planning application for the site is already under review, alongside ongoing discussions around funding for local infrastructure and services through Section 106 agreements. Detailed planning applications for individual parts of the village will follow in due course. For more information the link is:

The Council passed a motion to address issues with **Mobile Phone Signal in Rural Areas**. Mobile phone reception coverage is very patchy in West Oxfordshire; Freeland and the western part of Long Hanborough are particularly badly affected. It is a source of frustration for residents.

There is also growing concern as traditional BT copper phone lines are being phased out and customers are being moved to Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP), which relies solely on the power supply. During a power outage, households in non-signal areas are cut off and at risk. This problem affects many rural areas across the UK, and it is why I raised a motion at the Council to bring the matter to the Government's attention and demand its urgent resolution. Following the Council's support for the motion, the WODC Director of Place engaged with the Council Members to identify no-signal areas across the district.

The Council will request technical support from the OCC, and then the Leader of the Council will write to the Minister of State for Culture, Media and Sport, requesting an urgent resolution to this problem. I will monitor progress on this matter.

OXFORD BUS AND MORRIS MOTORS MUSEUM

Tricycles became popular 150 years ago. The Penny Farthing reached the peak of its popularity in the 1870s. However, not everyone was keen to ride such contraptions. There were many accidents and injuries, and some people were not physically capable of climbing onto a Penny Farthing, balancing, and safely dismounting. An alternative was needed.



Tricycles had been around since 1819, but no model had ever been put into production. The French had been the major innovators in the development of cycles but the Franco-Prussian war in 1870 meant their engineering expertise was diverted for military purposes.

In 1876 an Englishman, James Starley of Coventry, took out a patent for the Coventry Lever tricycle. His first model was constructed with lever gearing, but he quickly abandoned that for a chain-driven model.

James later designed a 'Differential Gear' so that the wheels could rotate at different speeds when cornering. Such devices are used on motor vehicles today. However, James cannot be said to have invented the differential because earlier versions existed although James was probably unaware of them. He registered a patent in 1877, number 1956.

The photograph is of Royal Salvo Companion tricycle on display in the museum. It is designed for the gentleman to sit on the right with the higher saddle, as we look at the photograph, while the lady sat on the left. This tricycle became known as the 'Sociable'. The gentleman had control of both the rack & pinion steering, which was operated by the middle upright handle, and the brake, which was operated by the lever to the left of the gentleman.

In April our free heritage bus rides restart on the **first and third Sundays of the month** for the summer season. **Our popular Easter Chick Hunt will be held on 5th April Easter Sunday, and on the Easter Monday Bank Holiday. Our Easter Bunny will be about on both days.**

On **Sunday 26th April** some of our vehicles will be participating in 'Drive It Day' organised by the National Association of Road Transport Museums, of which we're a member. While the event is not at the museum, we expect many visiting vehicles at the start and end of the day.

HAVE YOU WATCHED CHANNEL 4'S DIRTY BUSINESS?

The three-part series, produced in collaboration with local campaign group Windrush Against Sewage Pollution (WASP), follows Professor Peter Hammond and Ash Smith as they expose sewage pollution and regulatory failures that have allowed it to continue. The programme lays bare what many communities already know: the raw sewage is being dumped into the rivers and seas across England, killing the ecology and creating risk to human health and life.

WODC has been working proactively to drive change:

- Meeting regularly with Thames Water to discuss issues of infrastructure shortfalls and sewage spills on land
- Pressing Thames Water for urgent infrastructure investments
- Introducing Council-controlled Grampian planning conditions so new homes cannot be occupied until sewage upgrades are completed and operational;
- Publishing the list of approved housing developments under the Grampian condition, to make sure all stakeholders are aware of the potential home delivery delays Engaging with national regulators, the Environment Agency and Ofwat for stronger oversight
- Lobbying the government to resolve the current scandalous sewage pollution crisis
- Working closely with WASP, catchment partnerships and community groups and pushing for accountability
- Hosting our annual Waterways Fair to bring residents, experts and campaigners together to raise awareness and strengthen the campaign to get our rivers clean.

Dirty Business is a powerful and deeply moving account of a national scandal. Thanks to the team at WASP for exposing what has been happening. The Council will continue pushing for the investment and action our communities and environment deserve.

REVIEW: SPRING CONCERT (FREELAND ORCHESTRA & WOC)

The Freeland Orchestra and West Oxfordshire Clarinets (WOC), both conducted by villager Wendy Marks, produced a wonderful concert in front of a capacity audience at St Leonard's Church, Eynsham, on 7th March.

The orchestra's refreshing and engaging performance of Beethoven's Overture to the Creatures of Prometheus, followed by Haydn's beloved 'London Symphony' (no 104), exhibited balanced and at times captivating ensemble playing under Wendy Marks' crisp and generous direction.

In the Overture in particular, and in the Symphony's Minuet, the upper strings were well supported by the resonant double bass and cellos, while the entire section meshed seamlessly with the winds and brass. Both pieces alternate between mellow and energetic passages: the orchestra's ability to play subtle dynamics and to shape each phrase with care enhanced the tension and release inherent in Beethoven's and Haydn's works.

WOC's 14 players followed suit. Strauss' Overture to Die Fledermaus, arranged by Wendy, got us off to a brisk and entertaining start. The gentle, rich and sinuous arrangement of Weber's piano duet indirectly showcased the composer's love for the instrument. A highlight of their performance was Catozzi's piece for Solo Contrabass clarinet.

Mike Laidlaw, the Choir's contrabassist, gave an assured performance, demonstrating the instrument's extraordinary range.

Those three classical pieces were followed by a deeply affecting arrangement (by Patterson and Marks) of the American folk song Shenandoah. The concert ended with Richard Percival's Danzón and Charleston, in which the clarinet choir displayed a wonderful sense of rhythm without compromising on musicality.

It is often said that the clarinet is the closest to the human voice in range and expressiveness. Anyone listening to WOC's rich blend of warmth and playful energy would agree.

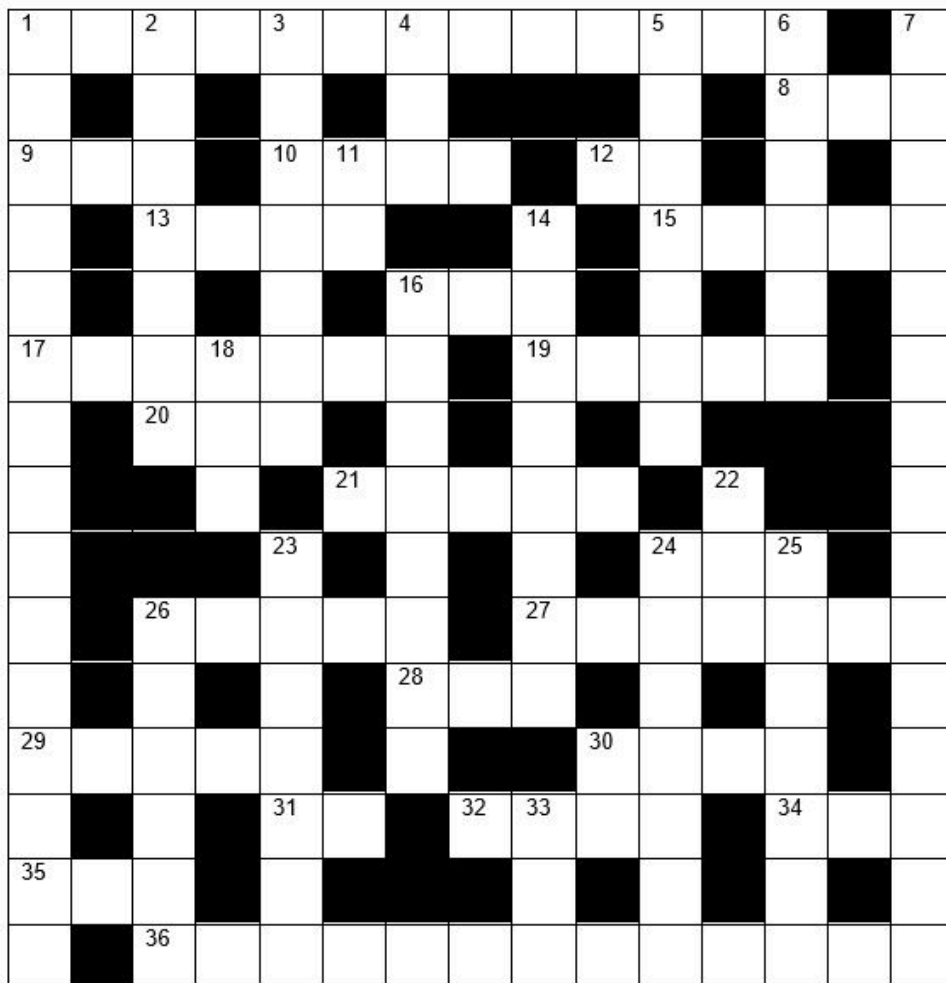
